Punctuation & Quotations

- When directly quoting, include all punctuation as it appears in the original MINUS the end punctuation (which goes after the citation) EXCEPT for ? or !
- Example: “I would, if given the opportunity, rule the world” (Pechauf 4).
- Example: “My painting won!” (Hoferer 83)

Quotes that don't end the sentence

- If you're quoting multiple examples in a sentence, put the comma inside the quotation mark (except for the last example). Semicolons would go outside the quotation marks.
- Example: The poet uses words like “gooey,” “toothpaste-thick,” and “sticky” to describe the texture (Woehner l. 4-11).
- Example: Weitz describes the man as “tall, wiry, yet totally unbendable”; the man is an obstacle for the protagonist (190).

Quotations within Quotations

- To differentiate a quotation within a quotation, use the usual “ double on the outside of the quoted text. Use a ‘ single quotation to surround the inside quotation.
- Example: Luigi “finally snapped, yelling ‘Don’t you dare!’ at Mario” (Stosselmeyer).
